

Stepping Back in Time

P4 Travel Back in Time to the Days of the Romans!

P4 travelled to Trimontium (The Place of the Three Hills – The Eildons, near the Borders General Hospital, at Melrose.) But this was no ordinary trip, as we were about to go back in time!

There, we met Mr Gordon, a specialist on the Romans and soon we were in role as Roman soldiers, with Mr Gordon acting as our Centurion.

Some of us were given things to carry – a banner, wooden swords, T-pole back packs, a shield.



We had to speak in the old language of Latin, which the Romans would have used 2000 years ago, so we greeted Mr Gordon with, "Salve, Centurio," which means, "Hello, sir."

Then, we set off on a route march. We had to march to the orders of "Sin.., Dex..., which meant, "Left, Right."

On the way, we saluted some of the Roman gods, like Janus, who the Romans thought was the god of doors and gateways, and had two heads – one to look back, one to look forward.

Mr Gordon showed us where the Roman fort would have been. He pointed out the amphitheatre, where gladiators fought and there were chariot races there too.

We saw a monument at Trimontium and heard more about the soldiers at the fort. We passed the site of the Roman baths and where the mansio was. This was where people had to pay taxes.

It was a very windy day and we were glad to get to the end of the march and salute Mercury, the god of travellers.

snack each day for a week. They were treated to fresh fruit and vegetables, carrot cake, fruit smoothies and scones. Many thanks to all involved.






Berwickshire Schools Cross Country


